Key facts about Europe

Europe is a geographical **continent**. It is located in the northern hemisphere with the Arctic Ocean to the north, the Atlantic Ocean to the west and the Mediterranean Sea to the south. There are 51 countries in Europe with a **population** of around 742 million people – which is 10% of the global population.

Although World War Two involved countries from the whole world, Europe was the primary **Theatre of War**.

Comparing maps of Europe in WW2 and now

While physical geographical features change only rarely or very slowly, physical geographical features are not fixed and undergo many changes over time. Comparing maps from different periods in history can help us understand changes. The map of Europe has changed significantly since 1945: immediately following WW2 Germany's borders were changed, the country was divided into two (since re-united) and the capital city has changed. The country called Czechoslovakia is now two countries: The Czech Republic and Slovakia. Russia (which is partly in Europe and partly in Asia) was called the Soviet Union (USSR) and organised differently.


